COURT RECORDS

Civil court records are of immense value to the genealogist, as they contain extensive biographical material. The records of these courts are usually kept on a county level for primary actions, and may be referred to by a number of names, including Circuit Court, Chancery Court, Superior Court or Court of Common Pleas.

Although often times the records of these courts concern writs, affidavits, depositions, subpoenas, testimonies, decrees, and other actions involving personal suits, there are also many cases in which the judge, as a civil official, makes use of the court session to order and receive reports on public (local government) activities such as surveys, grand jury members and proceedings, naturalizations, etc.

Indexes are maintained to court proceedings. However, such indexes may not name every person involved in a proceeding.

LAND RECORDS

Records involving the transfer of land (and in some cases, other property of value) contain a great deal of biographical information. In a good percentage of transactions, family relationships are mentioned directly, and even more often, relationships are referred to indirectly.

References to residences is standard, thus enabling the researcher to map the personal and family migrations from one region to another. Also, previous owners of the property in question are often mentioned, making it possible to document relationships by family ownership of a tract of land, or other property, over an extended period of time.

Generally, land records are indexed two ways; by Grantor (the party selling the property), and by Grantee (the party buying the property). Although all persons involved in the transaction are often mentioned in one or both indexes, witnesses or persons posting bond may not be listed.

Marriage Bonds

Bonds were posted by a person or persons associated with the bride and/or groom (often a relative) at the time of engagement, to assure that the committment would be honored.

Quite often there are typescript copies of these bonds, in alphabetical order by groom's surname, with an index to brides. For North Carolina, a computer-generated record of all bonds for the state is available on microfiche.

This example shows a typescript copy of bonds for Rowan County, North Carolina, organized alphabetically by grooms' surnames. Also shown are the names of the brides, bondsmen and witnesses, and the date of the bond (**not** the marriage).

Marriage Records

Marriage records are not as common as marriage bonds, possibly due to the transient nature of ministers in the South. These records note the names of the bride and groom, the date of the ceremony, and the place of the ceremony. Quite often these records also show the ages, residences, parents, witness(es), and the official performing the ceremony.

Although some marriage records are kept on a county basis, many were kept in journals by "circuit ministers," and have not been filed in any specific geographical order. In fact, some of these journals are still in the possession of the descendants of the ministers.

The first example shows a marriage certificate recorded by the county clerk. This entry shows the names of the bride and groom, their ages and residences, the date of the ceremony, the church involved, the name of the minister, and the name of the clerk.

The second example shows a marriage recorded by the minister. This entry shows the names of bride and groom, their ages and county of residence, and the name of the minister, including a statement of his authority, both from his church and the county.

**Tax Records From Logan County, Kentucky
(From GS Film # 008,122)**

Landowners – resident in a county were enumerated on a regular basis (often once a year) for tax purposes. As this enumeration shows the head of the household, numeric evaluation of other household residents, land valuations, and tenants, it is often used for a census substitute.

The example shows a county tax enumeration containing the above information. The information was gathered in June of 1807, and the landowners listed in alphabetical order by first letter of the surname.

PROBATE RECORDS

Probate records are those records which relate to the apportionment of an estate after its owner's death. Although not all people who died left property, the majority of persons living in the United States are mentioned in some form of probate record, either their own, or the record of a close relative. Such records are usually kept on a county level.

As the distribution of property after death is usually a family-oriented activity, probate records contain numerous references to family relationships, both inside and outside of the immediate family of the deceased, often regardless of the geographic location of the survivors.

Although probate records are usually indexed only by the name of the testator, some localities contain a "cross-index" or "grantees index," or other index to the legatees.

In the will shown, the testator names his wife and children by name and relationship to him, and distributes his worldly possessions among them.

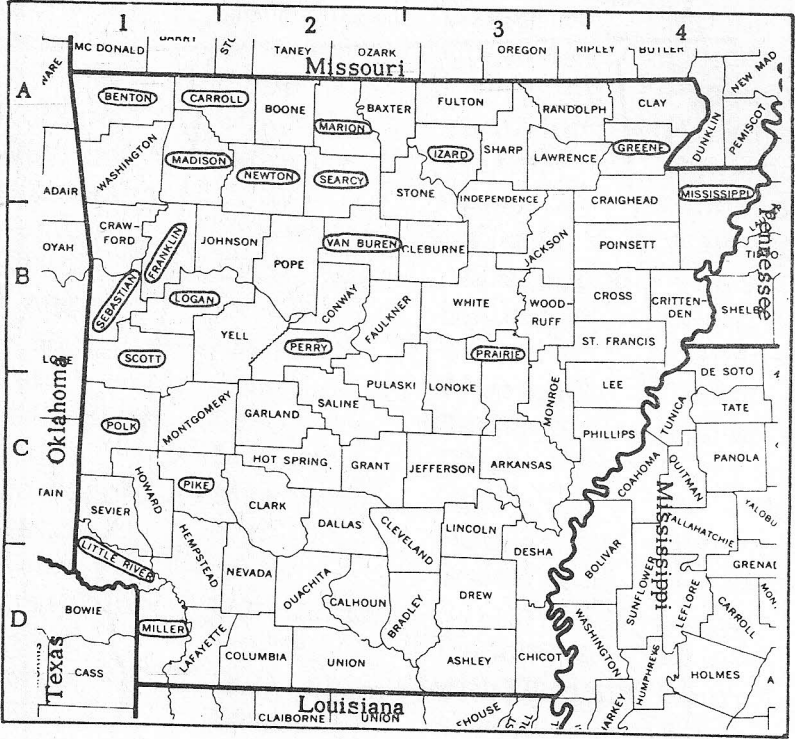

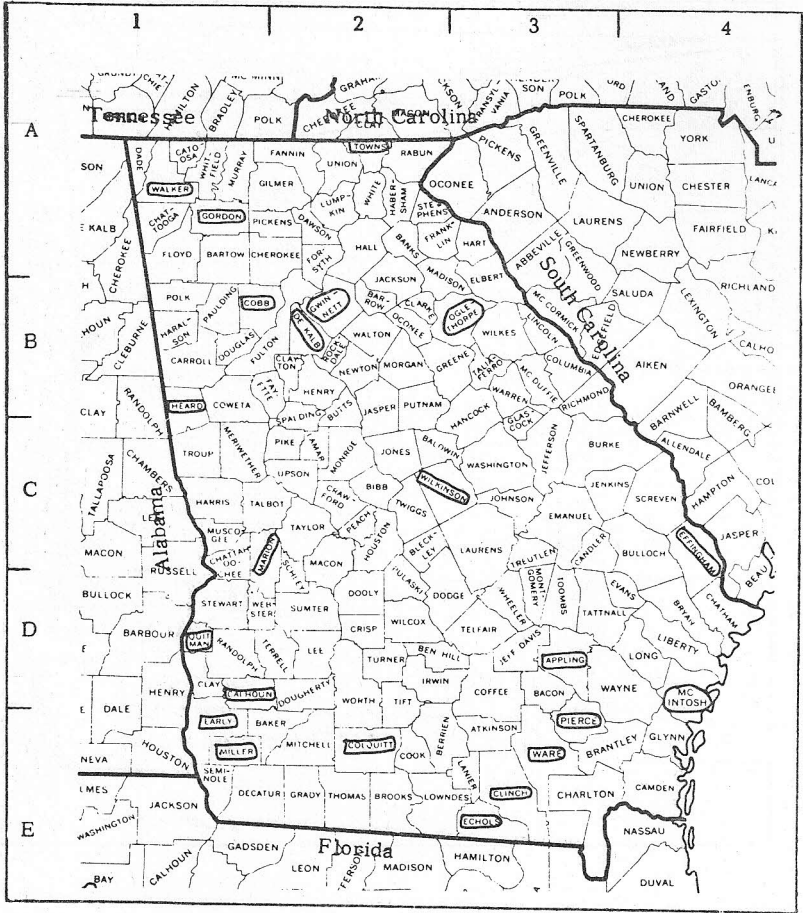

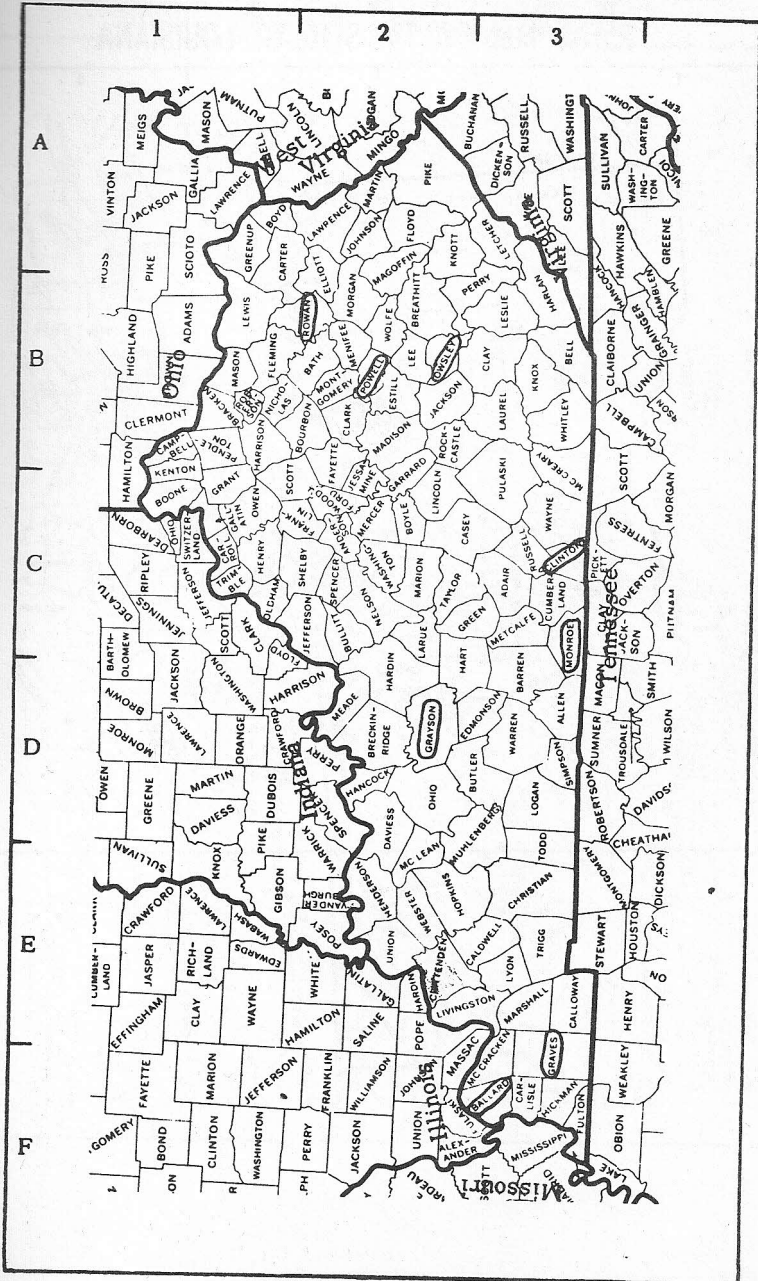
County Map For The State Of ARKANSAS



County Map For The State Of GEORGIA



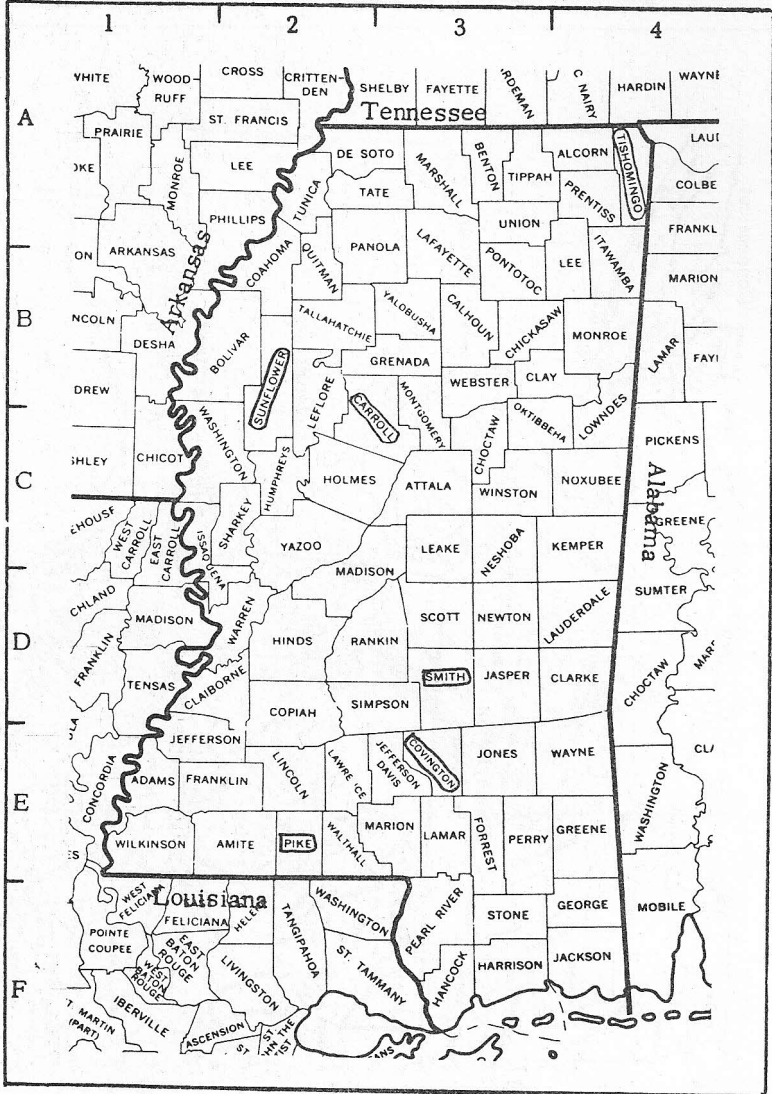
County Map For The State Of KENTUCKY



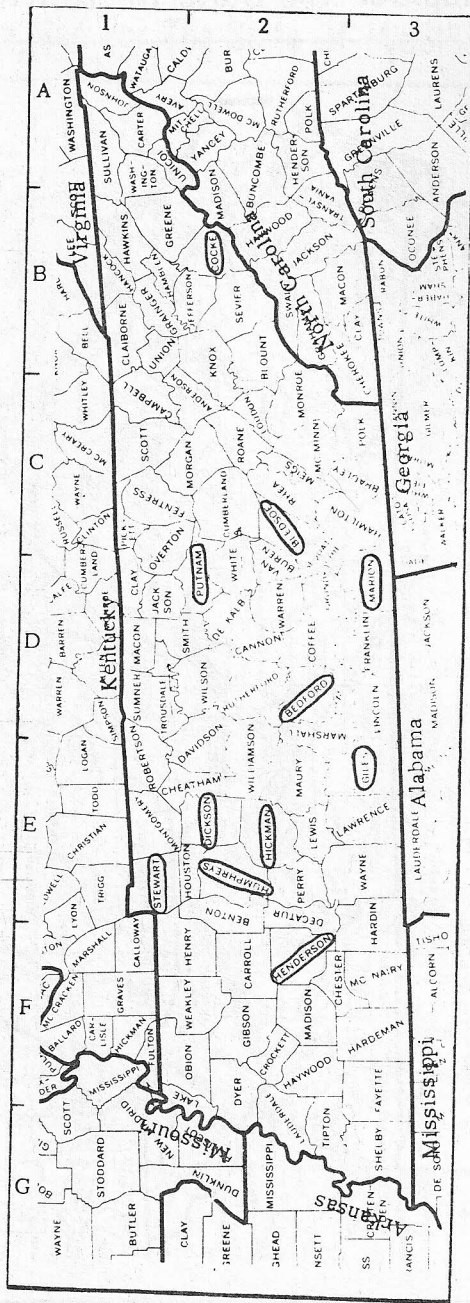
